Hand hygiene is everyone's responsibility

- It protects our patients you your family
- It's part of our vision: It makes us a trustworthy partner and helps us in our commitment to deliver world-class care, and improve the health and well being of the community
- Hospitals have eliminated hospital acquired infections through the use of improved hand hygiene

Hand Hygiene is the single most important method to protect from transmitting germs and preventing infections.

 If you are identified as not complying with hand hygiene expectations – first meeting is you and your manager. Second event, you and your manager will meet with the Quality leader.

We are asking everyone to commit to these tasks:

- Wash my hands
- · Wash my hands frequently
- Speak up when I observe others not washing their hands as necessary
- Allow feedback from others on the frequency of my hand washing
- Scripting to ensure handwashing
- Did you TAKE 5? (This means, did you wash your hands?)
 - Please wash your hands using the waterless or soap and water.
 - We must wash our hands to protect our patients, please wash your hands.
- I Have A Concern that you could spread infection, please wash your hands. (Pull person aside, do not say this in front of a patient.)
- If hand hygiene is not completed after these interventions, notify the appropriate manager, and enter a Safecare under Infection Control/Hand Hygiene Compliance.
- Your commitment

- I agree to comply with hand hygiene by performing hand hygiene every time I enter and every time I exit a room.
- I commit to clearly speak up when I observe others not cleaning their hands.
- I commit to not getting upset when another person asks me to clean my hands.

By doing this I am committing to providing world class care.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is a stand down meeting?

 A stand down is a brief meeting for all employees to pause and discuss an immediate important topic and key lessons learned usually occurring following a safety incident.

Why are we doing this?

- Hospital acquired infections are a serious issue at hospitals across our ministry. Because of this, a separate stand down meeting will help to bring the level of seriousness to our employees.
- Practicing good hand hygiene is important in providing amazing patient care and is the right thing to do.

Why are we doing this now?

 Reducing hospital acquired infections is a major focus across the ministry. We need to take action now to improve our standards to reduce the infections.

Why do we need to hold a separate meeting for this? Can't we do this as a part of our regular huddles or annual reviews?

 Because hospital acquired infections are a serious issue, holding a separate meeting sets this tone of seriousness and the level of importance to all employees.

I don't provide direct patient care. Do I still have to participate?

• Yes. Even simply visiting public places within the hospital such as the cafeteria and lobby can put patients at risk if you are not actively practicing good hand hygiene.
