

Anatomy for Dermatology

- Dermatologists are very specific in describing locations.
 - For example, for the same lesion...
 - A PCP may simply use the location of "nose".
 - A dermatologist would say "right lateral nasal tip".
- Precise locations <u>avoid confusion!</u>

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Terminology of "Direction"

- Right or Left
 - Usually abbreviated (e.g., "RT" and "LT")

RIGHT SIDE



LEFT SIDE

Terminology of "Direction"

- Proximal/Distal
- Superior/Mid/Inferior
- Anterior/Posterior
- Medial/Lateral
- Dorsal/Ventral (aka "Volar")

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
Proximal/Distal

- Describes location on an appendage in relation to the point of origin of the appendage itself.
- Primarily used for describing locations on the limbs.
 - Any appendage (such as nose/fingers) can have proximal and distal regions.

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Proximal/Distal


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- Primarily used for describing locations on the limbs.



Proximal/Distal

 These terms can apply to any body part which has a single point of origin.





Superior/Mid/Inferior

- "Superior" = on or near the "uppermost" or "highest" part.
- "Mid" = on or near the "middle".
- "Inferior" = on or near the "lowest" part or area closest to the base.

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Superior/Mid/Inferior

- Sometimes common "lay" terms are used in place of "Superior" or "Inferior".
 - "Superior" can also be described as "Upper".
 - e.g., "Upper Back" instead of "Superior Back".
 - "Inferior" can also be described as "Lower".
 - e.g., "Lower Back" instead of "Inferior Back".

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Anterior/Posterior

- Simply indicate "front" or "back".
 - Anterior = On the "front" side of the body.
 - Posterior = On the "back" side of the body.



There is no "interior" when describing anatomical locations!!


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


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



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















Anatomy Review

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



































In Conclusion...
